#### Jordan Nash says it's not all glitz and glamour.

Jordan Nash plays the character Peter Pan in a new film called *Come Away*, which combines the adventures of *Alice in Wonderland* with *Peter Pan*. "I took the original Peter and tried to make him my own," Nash tells

The Week Junior. He combined elements of his own personality with Peter from the story by J.M. Barrie, which was first published in 1911. "Peter's very brave," says Nash, "which is confusing, because I'm a scaredy cat."

Jordan, who is 13 years old, grew up in London and "luckily", he says, has no siblings. He is home-schooled so his parents accompany him on set, teaching him lessons in the trailer between scenes.

Jordan got his first big role when he was five, but says "I don't have a

clue how I got into acting." However it happened, he clearly has a knack for it. He was recently nominated for Best Debut Performance in the BBC Audio Drama Awards for his lead role in *Oliver: Lagos to London*.

The best part of his job is the travel. For Come Away, he spent a month in the US, with the Maleficent star Angelina Jolie, who plays his mother. Off set, she took him sightseeing and they had an Indian takeaway at her house. Nash says the worst part of his job is

waiting around. Between scenes there are long pauses while the equipment is moved and the set is taken down. "Ah, the glitz and the glamour," says Jordan, "I haven't experienced much of that."
